DESCRIPTION OF BILLS

[HB 2689](#)

Provides licensing exemption for person slaughtering not more than 1,000 rabbits for use as human food. We opposed on grounds it would increase slaughter of rabbits for food even though many people consider them companion animals. Passed. (We scored the Senate vote only because we had not taken a position against the bill before the House voted.)

[HB 2904](#)

Requires Oregon Health Sciences University to annually report on its website certain information regarding use of non-human primates for research and experiments. We supported to increase transparency regarding OHSU treatment of primates. Passed.

HB 2915	Prohibits retail pet store from offering to sell or selling dogs or cats. We supported to help reduce the market for mass breeding operations (aka "puppy mills"). Passed.
HB 3213	Prohibits selling cosmetics tested on animals. We supported because testing cosmetics and ingredients on animals is cruel and unnecessary. Passed.
HB 3464	Eliminates "predatory" status for beavers to allow better protection by Department of Fish and Wildlife. We supported because beavers should be treated more humanely and because beavers help create habitat for other fish and wildlife. Passed.
HCR 8	Designates rescued shelter dogs and cats as official state pet. We supported to help promote adoption from rescues and shelters. Passed.
SB 085	Increases regulation of new and expanding large confined animal feeding operations (CAFOs). We advocated for this bill to create a moratorium on new and expanded large CAFOs, but further regulation of large CAFOs generally may help improve the welfare of farm animals. Passed.
